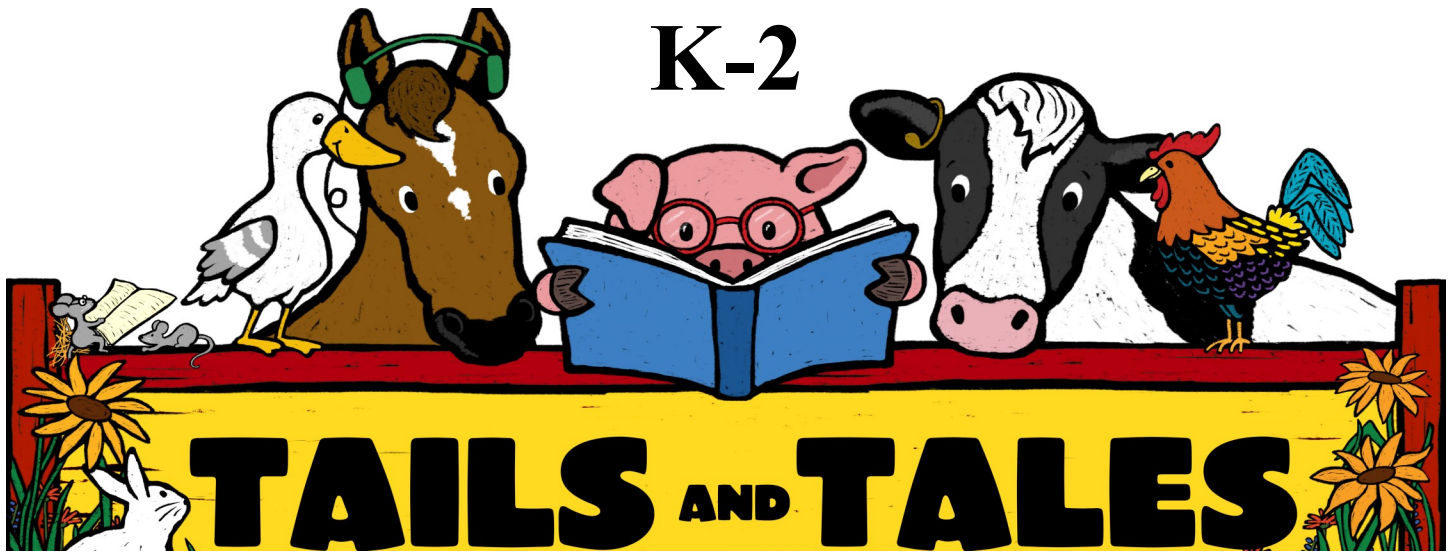

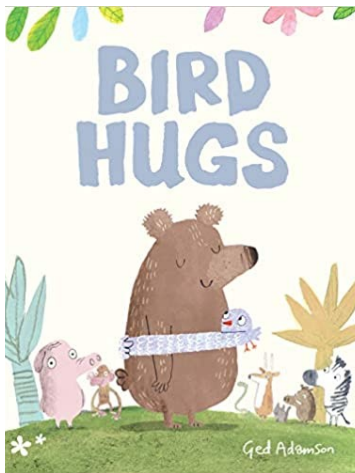

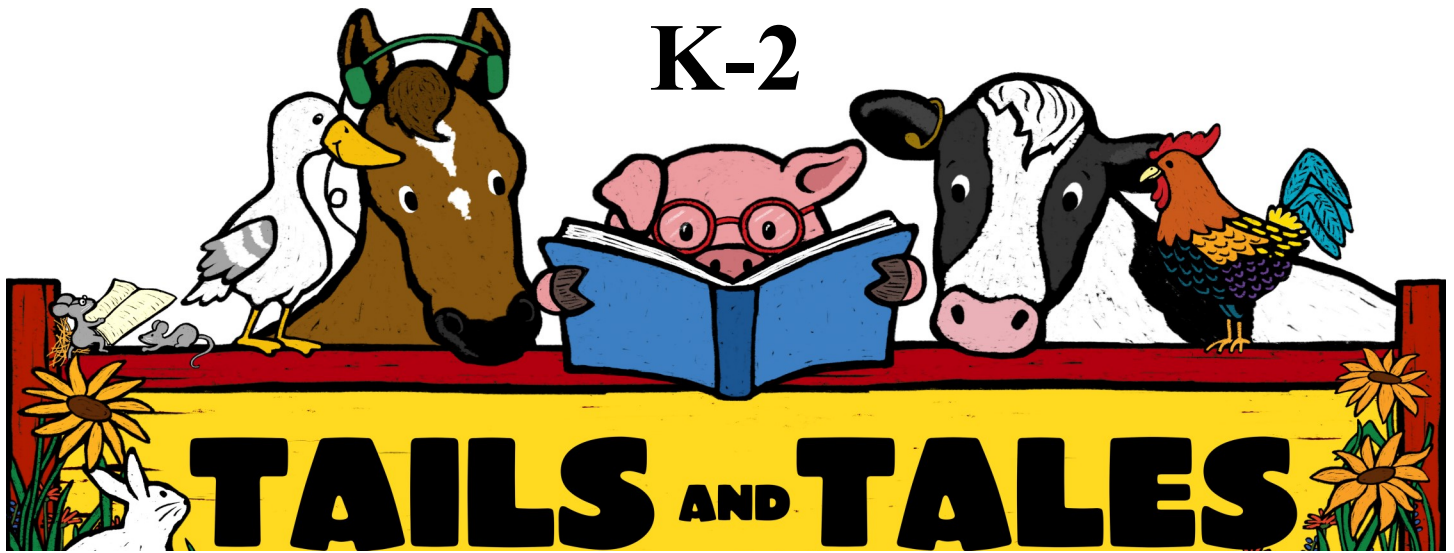


The Book Hog by Greg Pizzoli

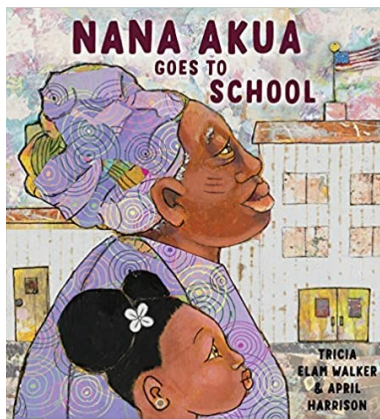
The Old Truck

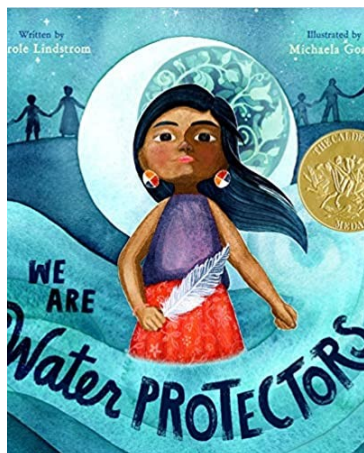

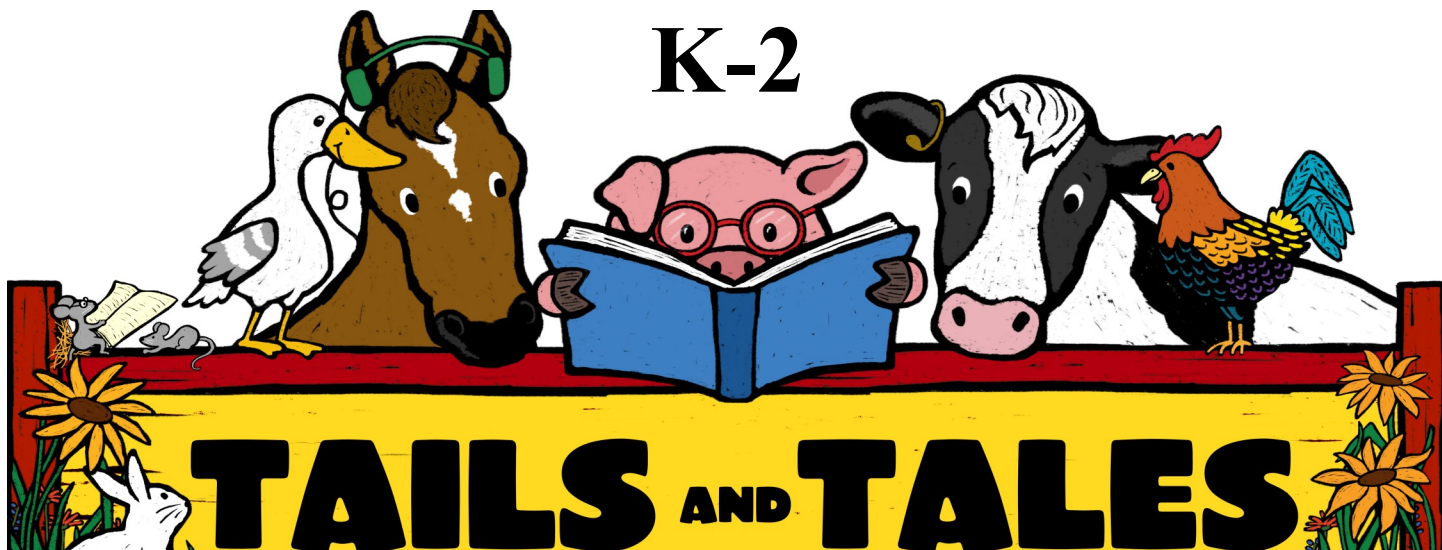
We are Grateful: Otsaliheliga

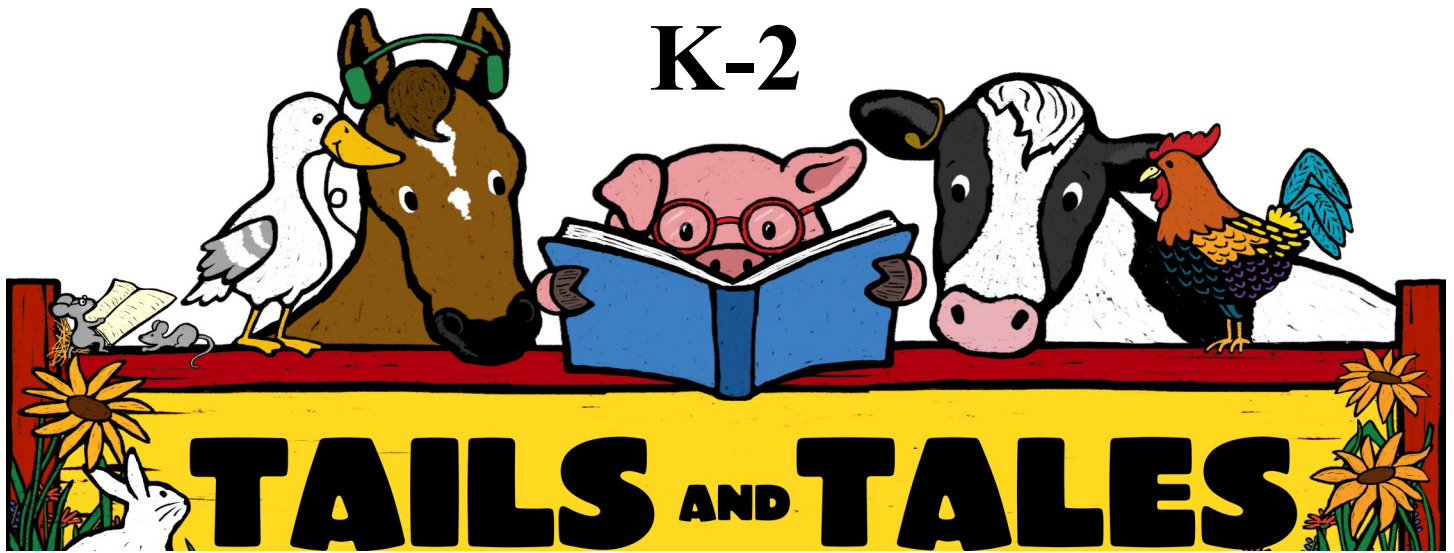


Rosemary Wells

In this bilingual version of the classic rhyme set in Peru, María takes her llama to school one day. | Lexile: AD530L

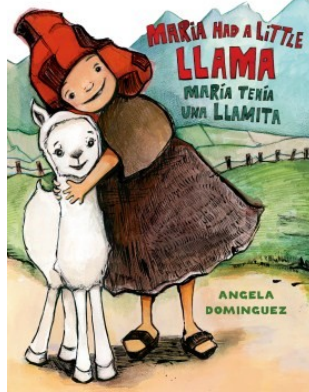
Abuela by Arthur Dorros
